**Vol. 6 No. 3 (November)** An appraisal of world development prospects in the 1980s, together with a critical review of work in this field.

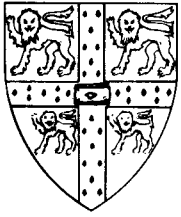
